You must have paid the full WI subscription at your main WI because this is the way that you receive *WI Life*, your Membership Voucher Booklet and any promotions from WI Enterprises.

You must then pay to your second WI the part of the subscription that is retained by WIs (WI Share). This amount is set by NFWI and for 2018 it is £20.

It is very important to remember that as a dual member, although you may vote at the meetings of both WIs, you may NOT vote on constitutional matters and

resolutions on public affairs, or stand for election as an Officer, committee member or delegate of the second WI. **This can only happen at your main WI.**

CUSGARNE ORGANIC FARM WALK



Monday 23rd July CUSGARNE FARM 11am - 3pm

Join us for a guided walk around Cusgarne Organic Farm set on the side of a beautiful valley that has been owned and managed by the Pascoe family for over 200 years. It has 100 acres of pasture for its grass-fed Angus cattle. There are vegetables, hens, orchards and growing tunnels for crops sold in the farm shop. We will learn about the eco-buildings that have sheep's wool insulation, a solar thermal hot water heat recovery system and the biomass boiler that is fed by the carefully managed hedges on the farm. In addition, we will see inside the cob and stone eco-buildings, hear about the importance of bees and wildflowers and see the wildflower meadow. The orchard grows Cornish apple varieties for eating and cider making; and fruit and herb vinegars,

chutneys, marmalades and jam are made and sold in the farm shop. This is a rare opportunity for you to visit an organic farm, and hear about the owners' passion for growing healthy affordable food in a way that is kind to the environment.

ALLEVIATE LONELINESS WITH THE BIG LUNCH



One of our latest successful resolutions is "Link

Together", all about alleviating loneliness. Throughout the WI's 103 year history, members have sought to reach out to others in their communities, offering a chance for women to come together to make friends, learn new skills and work for change on the issues that matter to them. This is an ethos that stems right from our earliest days. This campaign calls on WI members to continue to reach out to others in our communities, and to continue welcoming new members.

Why not take a leaf out of the Eden Project's book and arrange a local Big Lunch? It is great fun and is a brilliant way to bring local people together. The Big Lunch is a simple idea: as many people as possible have lunch with neighbours annually on a Sunday in June in a simple act of community, friendship and fun. But of course, you can hold a Big Lunch whenever it suits you. Since starting 10 years ago, thousands of Big Lunches have taken place, with millions of people taking to their streets, gardens, and community spaces and halls for lunch and companionship. It doesn't matter how big or small your event is. It simply gets

people together and talking – and with a few inspired folk, it can lead to people doing more within their community.

The NFWI has put together a basic guide to inspire us to take action in our WIs and local communities. You can see the full guide on the NFWI website. Their tips include thinking about how you can make your events and social activities more accessible, open and inclusive; making small gestures where you can, like offering someone a lift or ringing a member you haven't spoken to in a while; welcoming guests at your meetings - offering an opportunity for guests to attend your WI is a good way for them to find out more about the WI; reaching out to new members by partnering them with existing members who know the ins and outs of your WI; and talking more about loneliness by inviting a speaker to one of your meetings from organisations working on the issue in your area.

The completed work will eventually hang there. Old photographs of the harbour front buildings will be provided by St Ives Archives and will be displayed along with the wall hanging.


Supporters have donated fabrics and threads and all those involved are donating their time.
