### HISTORY OF THE FLOWERS USED IN THE ARRANGEMENTS IN THE HOUSE

As far as possible flowers which were extant when Antony House was built have been used in the arrangements, and their history, compiled by Gwen Pickard. is given below:

Alstroemeria (Lily of the Incas): Sent by Claes Alstroemer and seeded in 1784.

Anemone:

Familiar to the Crusaders in the Holy Land,

but not recorded in Britain until the 16th century.

Calendula: (Marigold):

Introduced 1573.

Camellia Japonica:

Brought to Europe by Jesuit Priest, G.J. Kamel,

but not seeded successfully in England until 1802-6.

Chrysanthemum:

As in present form, circa 1795.

Delphinium Elatum:

Parent of our known species(from Siberia)in

early 16th century.

Dianthus (pinks):

Assumed to have come with building stone during the Norman Conquest - the carnation as such grown

in London gardens in 1722.

Eryngium (Sea Holly):

Introduced in 1656.

Euphorbia(Spurge):

Introduced 1548.

Gladiolus:

Earliest records - 1578.
